# **Procedures:**

**Reading a book:** Teacher will invite family members to come and read to the children. Have children to gather to listen and look at the book. Making sure that the reader engages the children by describing what they are seeing and allowing the children to touch the pictures (if they are able to).

**Shaving Cream Play:** Tape down on the floor or table the wax paper. Give each child a small amount of shaving cream and have them to play in the shaving cream. Demonstrate how they can make their letters, numbers, and shapes in the shaving cream. Have paper towels handy for clean up.

# **Procedures:**

**Reading a book:** Have children to gather to listen and look at the book. Making sure that the reader engages the children by describing what they are seeing and allowing the children to touch the pictures (if they are able to).

<u>Flashcards (Gold):</u> Pre make laminated cards with items that are gold (i.e. jewelry, etc) and any other color. Have the teachers will show the card to the children and then say the item and color. <u>Music and Movement:</u> Teachers will engage children in music and dancing. If child is mobile then have them to move their bodies and even standing a dancing with them. If child is not mobile help them to move their legs and hands.

#### **Procedures:**

<u>Sorting the Colors:</u> If child is mobile and can bounce a ball, demonstrate that you want them to bounce a ball and have them to try. When they try praise them and if they need assistance help them and praise them. If child is not mobile, have them on the floor on their stomachs and try to see if they will reach or roll the ball to you. Praise them for trying.

<u>Nursery Rhymes:</u> Play CD/ Music Player that has nursery rhyme music. If children are mobile have them to dance to the songs and sing. This is an opportunity for teachers to be silly with the children.

**Puppet Play:** Talk with children about the different things that happen in winter. Allow children to touch the puppets and ask questions to the puppets.

## **Procedures:**

<u>Handprint Snowflake:</u> paint the children's hands with blue paint using the sponge brush and helped them place their hands in different directions to create a unique snowflake design. Then use glitter pens to decorate the snowflake. After they dry, cut circles around them and mount them on blue paper. Next, hole punch them and tie them with ribbon. On the back write the following poem: (My handprint is like a snowflake. Unique in every way. Keep it close to your hear. I'm growing every day.)
