Indicators	Infants (0-6 months) Engage in tummy time and attempt to lift head	Infants (6-12 months) d. Reach for objects while supporting themselves during tummy time.



The teacher will set up a soft mat and place colorful, infant-safe oval objects slightly out of reach. The teacher will say, "Look at the red oval!" while gently shaking the object to capture attention. Caregivers will encourage infants to reach for the object during tummy time, assisting younger infants by placing hands under their arms for gentle support. The teacher will describe movements, saying, "You're reaching so far!"

Soft mat

Infant-safe oval objects (e.g., plush toys, soft rattles)

Indicators	Infants (0-6 months) Watch as a ball is rolled back and forth.	Infants (6-12 months) Attempt to grasp or push a rolling ball.



The teacher will introduce a soft red ball, rolling it slowly across the mat and saying, "See the ball roll!" The teacher will encourage older infants to push the ball back, guiding their hands if needed. Younger infants will watch the ball's movement, with the teacher describing its path, saying, "It's rolling towards you!"

Soft, lightweight red ball

Open floor space with a soft mat

Indicators	Infants (0-6 months) Sit with support, maintaining head control.	Infants (6-12 months) Sit independently and reach for toys.



The teacher will place infants in a seated position with supportive pillows. For younger infants, the teacher will assist by holding their sides gently, saying, "You're sitting tall!" Older infants will reach for red oval-shaped toys placed nearby, with the teacher encouraging them to pick up the objects and explore, saying, "What does it feel like?"

Indicators	Infants (0-6 months) Bat at hanging toys with hands.	Infants (6-12 months) Grasp and pull hanging toys.



The teacher will hang soft, colorful toys from a play gym, ensuring they are within the infants' reach. The teacher will encourage infants by saying, "Can you touch the red toy?" Younger infants will be guided to bat at the toys, while older infants will be encouraged to grasp and pull them down. The teacher will narrate their actions, saying, "You're holding it tight!"

The teacher will describe the sounds and rhythm, saying, "The music is fast—let's clap faster!"
