Activity: Soft Toys Basket

Infants will explore a basket filled with soft sensory toys used in previous weeks. They are encouraged to reach, hold, and manipulate the objects with minimal adult direction. Teachers observe and narrate the play, supporting independent engagement. This fosters initiative and builds persistence.

Activity: Rolling Time

Infants engage in rolling balls or soft toys across a mat toward a caregiver or peer. This promotes cause and effect and early turn-taking behaviors. Educators label actions ("You rolled it to me!") and encourage participation based on each child's interest level. This activity has been revisited several times throughout July.

Activity: Treasure Box Play

Infants are invited to explore a treasure box filled with safe, sensory-rich items from past weeks. Teachers guide discovery by labeling textures or shapes. Repetition helps infants remember objects, build problem-solving, and maintain focus longer than before. The treasure box is a familiar favorite for many.

Activity: Bubble Watch

Teachers blow bubbles gently while infants observe and respond. Some may track them with their eyes, others may try to reach, and some may vocalize with excitement. Bubbles were previously used during group play and help enhance visual tracking, anticipation, and joy in social settings.

Infants are encouraged to crawl or scoot toward a familiar object placed just out of reach. Teachers cheer them on with verbal cues and describe the action: "You're getting closer!" This activity was repeated in previous movement sessions and fosters determination and exploration.
