	May role-play simple shopping actions, such as picking up a pumpkin or giving pretend money.	May take on roles of seller or buyer, using dialogue and turn-taking during play.

Activity: Pumpkin Patch Market

Teachers will set up a pretend pumpkin patch in the dramatic play area with small pumpkins, baskets, and pretend money. Children will role-play as shoppers and sellers, practicing taking turns and exchanging items. Younger preschoolers will focus on exploring the props, while older preschoolers will begin adding language to their play ("I want to buy this pumpkin"). Teachers will encourage collaboration, fairness, and persistence in staying engaged in their roles.

	May name or point to a role they are interested in.	May role-play jobs such as farmer, baker, or gardener and explain their choices.

Activity: What Do You Want to Be?

Teachers will lead a group discussion about jobs connected to pumpkins (farmer, baker, gardener, grocery store clerk). Children will be invited to choose a role and act it out in play. Younger preschoolers may simply try on hats or props to represent the roles, while older preschoolers can extend their play with dialogue and teamwork. Teachers will support imagination and flexible thinking by asking questions like "How would a farmer take care of pumpkins?" or "What would a baker do with them?"

Activity: Imaginative Play: Pumpkin Patch

Teachers will expand the dramatic play pumpkin patch by adding hay, leaves, and toy wagons. Children can pretend to pick pumpkins, load them into wagons, or sell them to friends. Younger preschoolers may enjoy sensory exploration (touching hay, carrying pumpkins), while older preschoolers may develop imaginative scenarios (taking pumpkins home to cook or decorate). Teachers will encourage persistence by suggesting new ideas to extend the play.

	May scoop, pour, and feel the different textures in the bin with teacher support.	May sort, count, or role-play with items in the sensory bin and extend play by creating stories.

Activity: Fall Sensory Bin

Teachers will set up a sensory bin with dried corn kernels (or another safe filler), mini pumpkins, leaves, pinecones, farm animals, and small tools such as scoops and cups. Children will explore by scooping, pouring, and pretending to play in a fall farm scene. Younger preschoolers may focus on sensory play and identifying items, while older preschoolers will sort objects (big/small, type of item), count pumpkins or pinecones, and role-play stories about the farm. Teachers can prompt curiosity with questions like, "How many pumpkins can you find?" or "What happens on a farm in the fall?"

Resources/Materials • Large bin • Sensory filler (corn kernels, oats, or shredded paper) • Mini pumpkins • Farm accessories • Leaves, pinecones, acorns Key Vocabulary: fall, farm, scoop, pour, pumpkin Support:

Activity: Build a Pumpkin Patch

Children will work together to design and build their own pumpkin patch using blocks, fabric, and pretend pumpkins. Teachers will encourage collaboration and persistence, asking questions such as "How can we make our patch bigger?" or "What else do we need to add?" Younger preschoolers may build simple structures, while older preschoolers can problem-solve and add detailed features such as paths, fences, or stands.
