Activity: Who Works at the Zoo?

Talk with children about the many people who help take care of animals in a zoo: zookeepers, veterinarians, tour guides, cleaners, and more. Show pictures or use puppets to explain each role. Ask children which job they'd like to try. Role-play different jobs in the dramatic play area and discuss how each worker helps animals and visitors stay safe and happy.

Activity: Map the Zoo

Show a simple zoo map and talk about how zoos are divided into areas (like the lion area, reptile house, or bird zone). Let children create their own zoo maps using stickers, stamps, or drawings to represent animal areas. Then ask them to give a "tour" of their zoo, using words like "next to," "behind," or "between."

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Activity: Animal Homes Around the World

Introduce children to animals from different parts of the world. Show a world map and place pictures of zoo animals in their native locations (e.g., pandas in China, lions in Africa). Discuss how animals live in different climates and what they need to survive. For older preschoolers, include how zoos provide resources for animals that can't live in the wild anymore.

Activity: Zoo Rules

Ask children: "What rules would we need if we visited a real zoo?" Write their answers on chart paper and create a class list of zoo rules. Talk about how rules help keep people and animals safe. Reinforce concepts of respect, quiet voices, and staying together. Let them act out good zoo behavior with puppets or stuffed animals.

Activity: Where Would You Live?

After reviewing animals from different habitats (jungle, desert, arctic, etc.), ask each child to pick a place they would want to live if they were a zoo animal. Provide pictures of different regions and let children draw themselves as animals in that space. Discuss why they chose it. This builds self-awareness and connections to geography.
