	May respond to rhythm or movement during counting songs.	May anticipate claps or move hands in response to counting.

Activity: Counting Claps

Sit with infants face-to-face and clap softly while counting "1, 2, 3." Pause between each clap so infants can listen and watch your hands. Encourage them to move or babble as you repeat the rhythm. Over time, some infants may begin to imitate the movement or sound. Counting through songs and gestures builds early number awareness and rhythm recognition.

	May watch or reach for objects being stacked.	May attempt to stack or knock down objects during play.

Activity: Stacking Cups and Rings

Provide large stacking cups or rings for infants to explore. Model stacking slowly, describing what you're doing ("cup on top," "ring down"). Allow them to knock down the stack and try again. Encourage older infants to attempt stacking independently. This supports coordination, cause-and-effect thinking, and early understanding of order and size.

	May explore shapes by touching and mouthing pieces.	May attempt to fit a shape into the correct space.

Activity: Shape Puzzle

Offer a large, simple shape puzzle focusing on ovals, circles, and squares. Describe each piece as you help the infant explore it ("This is an oval. It's smooth and round"). Allow time for open exploration - tapping, stacking, or feeling the edges. Repetition helps them begin to notice differences in size and shape while strengthening fine motor control.

	May look at or reach for brightly colored toys.	May place similar-colored toys together or hold up matching pieces.

Activity: Sorting Large Blocks by Color

Provide red, yellow, and green blocks. Encourage infants to explore by holding or moving them. Describe colors clearly as they play ("You have a red block!"). Model sorting by color, placing same-colored blocks in small piles. Infants may begin to notice similarities and repeat movements, supporting color awareness and early comparison.

	May smile or move when body parts are named or touched.	May lift or wiggle feet or hands when named or counted.

Activity: Counting Feet and Hands

Sing a playful counting song while gently counting each hand and foot. Say, "One hand, two hands! One foot, two feet!" Emphasize touch and tone to help infants connect words to their bodies. Encourage giggles, kicks, and wiggles during counting to build engagement and trust while introducing the idea of pairs and numbers.
